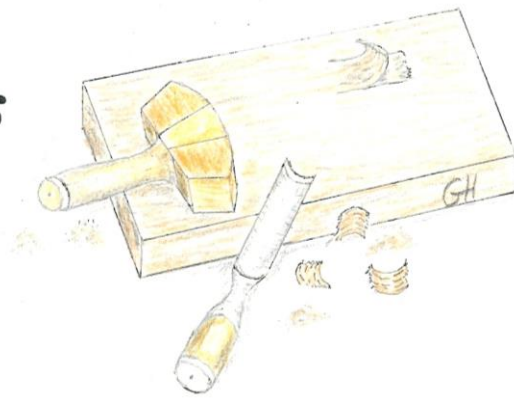


# Peninsula Woodworkers Club

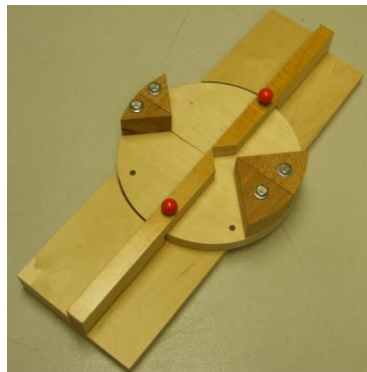

SHOW AND TELL

Dick Boyd showed us a mortising chisel handle that he turned on a treadle lathe. He had to clean up the chisel when he bought it. He also made and showed us a vise handle made from oak and cocobolo. He also showed us some figured wood from a redwood stump that was buried underground.
