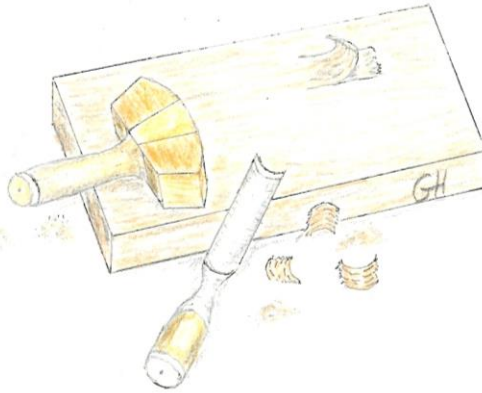


Peninsula Woodworkers Club

Bruce Thompson won the attendance drawing.

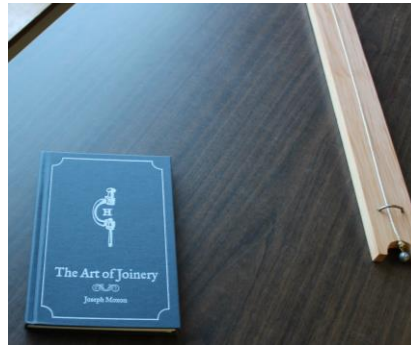
SHOW AND TELL

Rachael Boyd brought in a book, The Art of Joinery by Joseph Moxon and a "newly made" plumb board which was illustrated inside.

Jonathan White showed us three books he had just received.

Bruce Thompson brought in some wedges which fit right in with Jon Cash's Round Table. Wedges are easy to make and use.



Jon Fager brought in an assortment of feather boards and push sticks and shared information about what features should be sought in them. For instance, if the hand and push stick should develop any instability the hand would tend to land on the table saw well clear of the moving blade.



Jake Tiemersma made a bowl from a beautiful piece of myrtle. The block was oriented to show off the grain and figure to best advantage.



Jon Cash brought in a wooden tri-square and an article, I think, from Fine Woodworking.

Jeff Considine brought in a pretty block of Maple for us to see.



ROUND TABLE

Wedges and Woodworking presented by Jon Cash. A wedge is nothing more than two flat planes that merge at a common line. They are easy to make and use and can be arranged to hold all manner of shapes solidly. Some species make better wedges than do other species.



As one can see from this photo, taken after the meeting was adjourned, folks continued with the after meeting meeting. That tells me we had a good meeting.



Remember, each time you are present at a meeting, if your dues are paid, your name goes in the bowl for the membership attendance drawing which is held every third meeting. At our April meeting there were 33 entries.
