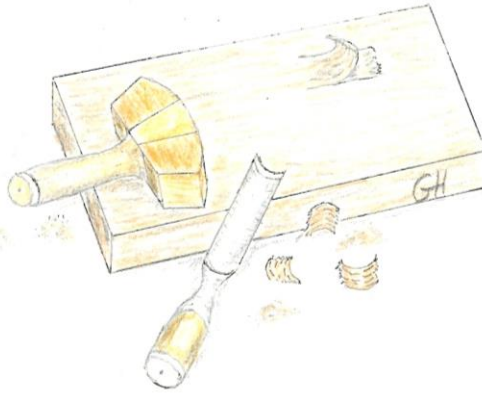


# Peninsula Woodworkers Club

SHOW AND TELL

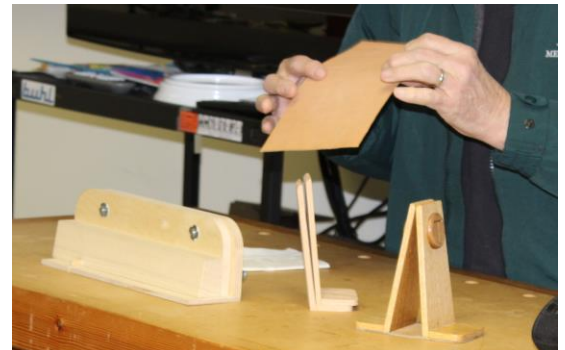

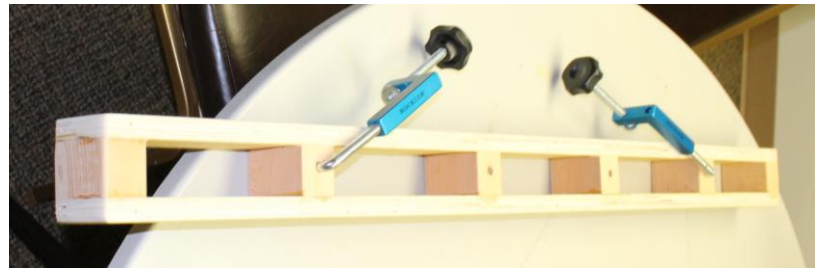
Bruce Thompson brought in some napkin holders and the jig for making the proper cuts

Circles and Holes Using the Router. Jon showed us few minutes of a router tutorial and then spoke to us about what could be done. Jonathan White's presentation dovetailed right into Jon's presentation.
