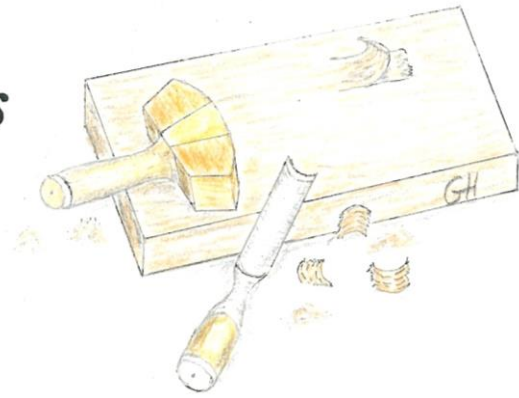


# Peninsula Woodworkers Club

Tom Howell recently acquired some dark cherry wood and donated it to whoever in the club could use it.

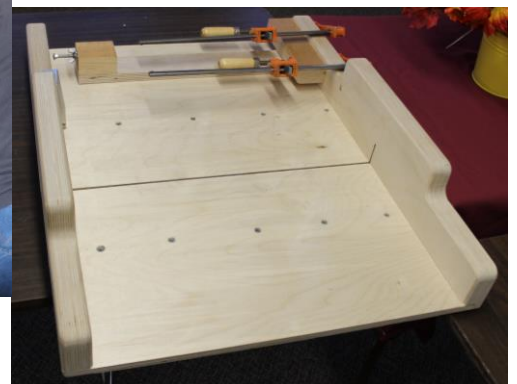


Ted Ripley is a wood turner and I think I heard him say he prefers stock which is not perfect.

They got together and worked on the saw and built a new sled to machinist tolerances. The clamps were part of the equipment they used to get and hold the tolerances they were shooting for. My dad was a machinist and tool and die maker. Many hours spent in the basement with him gave me an appreciation of what Bruce wanted.



## ROUND TABLE

Jon Cash led the round table on drilling. A drill press is probably the best way to go at it. For angle drilling use a jig. For a drill press many of them have a way to change the table angle. There is a plethora of drill bits, twist bits, spade bits, Forstner bits and so forth. Depth control can be achieved with a piece of masking tape, a block of wood or setting the depth control on your drill press. Bit rpm can be important. Use a pin punch to make a center point. To get a clean hole use a backer board to eliminate bottom tear out. There are a number of specialty bits – counter sink, centering bits, extra long bits, tapered bits.

This was a really informative round table.

Do you have something you want to learn how to do? We've got all sorts of talent in this club. If we don't have the person available, we probably can bring somebody in, a boat builder and his boats, a trailer builder and his gypsy style trailer and a violin maker and his violins. Let any board member know.

Remember, each time you are present at a meeting, if your dues are paid, your name goes in the bowl for the membership attendance drawing which is held every fifth meeting.
