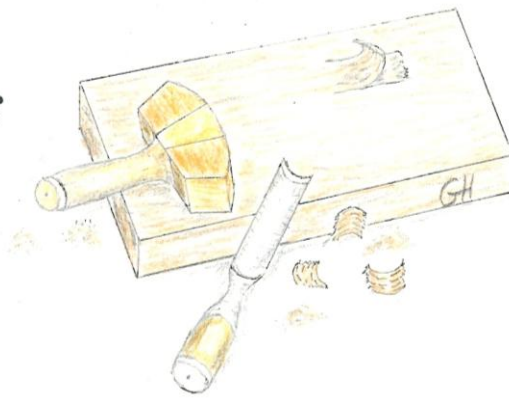


# Peninsula Woodworkers Club

Dick Boyd won the member attendance drawing, \$25.00 at Angeles Mill Work.

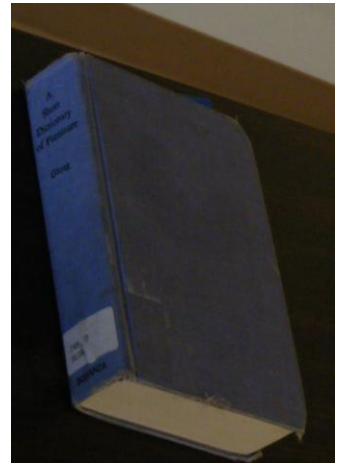
The Wooden Boat was the week after our meeting. Did anybody attend?

## ROUND TABLE

To sand or scrape? Do you tack? With what? According to many it's better not to sand, but if you must do you need to do it outdoors? Better to plane or use a scraper (burnished to a sharp hooked edge)? How well does the wood absorb finish? How much difference is there between winter and summer wood? You may want to hit it lightly with #220 to get some absorption. Some woods have a figure that is lost when sanded. When sanding how fast do you move the sander and with what grit?
